I am very happy I could go to Australia to improve my English skills. This experience was wonderful for me. I will never forget it.


Next year will be the 20th anniversary of this study trip so I recommend it to anyone interested in going abroad.

Spanish and Chinese from my friends. In return, I taught them Japanese and about Japanese culture because they were really interested in Japan.


